BE AN ALLY: Show your support openly and visibly.

Wear symbols such as rainbow pins or flags to signal your allyship. Attend LGBTQIA+ events, marches, and rallies to demonstrate solidarity.

OFFER SUPPORT: If someone you know comes out as LGBTQIA+, be supportive and affirming. Offer resources, information, and emotional support if they need it. Respect their journey and allow them to share their story on their own terms.



DONATE TO CHARITY: Sometimes showing your support can be as simple as "putting your money where your mouth is." Supporting LGBTQIA+ charities such as The Human Rights Campaign (hrc.org) or the Trevor Project (thetrevorproject.org) are just two charities out of hundreds that help the community.

Remember that supporting the LGBTQIA+ community is an ongoing commitment, and it is essential to listen to the needs and perspectives of the community itself. Actively engage with LGBTQIA+ individuals and organizations to ensure your support is meaningful.

This month's Under the Bucket comes to us from Trask Cryl of Krayt Clan, who has been an OM since March of 2017 and has been one of the clan's more active members. Trask comes from a family of Star Wars costumers with her parents and sister all members of the 501st and she had planned to build a death trooper until running into the mandos at Salt Lake City's FanX convention. While there, she turned to her mom and said, "I wanna build a mando."

Her choice of being a Chiss Mando, and her palace guard paint job were inspired by her love for the Star Wars: Knights of the Old Republic game.

Trask loves being a Chiss mando, and says that "she's so unique and she stands out," and she does stand out any time that she has her Bucket off because of her deep blue skin and piercing red eyes.

The troop that she told me about was a May the 4th troop at an elementary school involving members of the various Utah Star Wars clubs.

Many of the costumed people at the troop were nonspeaking characters (jawas and storm troopers who lacked mics and speakers) and so Trask acted as the, unofficial, voice for the group.

"It was super special that many of the kids at this school... loved talking and asking questions because they felt they could." Trask told me during our short interview, "We weren't just standing figures, but having someone they could talk to directly really made the event for them."

"I remember one little girl telling me that I was her favorite of the group," Trask told me, " and a lot the girls especially loved seeing me there because I was a noticeable girl... and it made them feel more involved and welcomed in Star Wars, when Star Wars is often considered by most kids as a boy thing."

"It is moments like that" she went
on, "that gives me all the reasons I
need to put on this armor and go to
these events, because of how the
kids light up when seeing these
awesome characters come to life."

# HYDRATION

Summer has finally shown itself in the northern hemisphere, which means it's time for our yearly reminder about hydration while trooping.

If you're new to the MMCC, you may not understand the amount of water you can lose in a very short amount of time. I remember my first Star Wars night at our local minor league Ball Park on a hot evening in July. After walking the concourse for 30 minutes or so, my flight suit was soaked, and no amount of water would quench my thirst. So what could I done better?

# **HYDRATE BEFORE YOUTROOP**

Being hydrated before a troop makes it easier to stay hydrated while trooping. Start hydrating several days before the troop so that your system will be prepared for the heat and stress of the troop. The NHS recommends drinking 1.2 liters (6 to 8 glasses) of water each day to maintain proper hydration. You should also limit your caffeine and alcohol intake, as they can cause dehydration, and can put unneeded stain on your circulatory system when the weather heats up.

# **HYDRATE DURING THE TROOP**

Drink before feeling thirsty. If you start feeling thirsty during the troop, you are already behind on your fluid replacement. The CDC recommends that you drink 8 ounces of water every 15 to 20 minutes while working in the heat. This translates to about 32 ounces of water per hour, and drinking small amounts at shorter intervals is better than drinking a lot of water all at once.

Now, one word of warning, be careful not to drink more than 48 ounces of water per hour. Doing this can throw off your salt levels in your blood causing a medical emergency.



# **HYDRATE AFTER YOU KIT DOWN**

Even if you've been diligent with your hydration during the troop, it can take a few more hours of water drinking to properly replace what you have lost during the troop. This might sound gross, but it's something that I learned when I was doing a lot of running when I was younger. When it's hot out and finish with an activity where I was doing a lot of sweating, I like to take a shot of pickle juice. Half a dixie cup of pickle juice (I like kosher dill) is full of salt and electrolytes that help you with your hydration recovery.

## **OTHER THINGS TO CONSIDER**

While the CDC frowns upon them because of their sugar content, I find that downing a sports drink while I'm kitting up helps to keep my electrolyte levels up and makes the troop more enjoyable, especially on a hot day.

Be sure to watch out for each other. Check in frequently with the other members of your clan to make sure that they are taking in water on a regular basis. When you're in troop mode and having fun, it's easy to forget and to not recognize (or to even ignore) the signs of dehydration until it's too late.

If you are acting as handler during a troop, make sure that you have bottles of water with you in a backpack, and that you are offering them to the costumed members frequently. If they refuse more than a couple of times, put the bottle into their hands and insist. Also, make sure that you are drinking as well. While you're responsible for the costumed members, you are also responsible for yourself.

Trooping in the summer can be a fun and rewarding experience, be sure to take care of your health, so that you can continue to troop and have fun.
